

Master's Degree in International Human Rights Protection

General and Basic:

- To possess and understand knowledge which provides a basis or an opportunity to be original in the development and/or application of ideas, often in a research context
- To be able to apply the knowledge acquired and problem-solving skills in new or little-known environments within broader (or multidisciplinary) contexts related to the area of study.
- To be able to integrate knowledge and to approach the complexity of formulating judgements on the basis of information which, even if incomplete or limited, includes reflections on the social and ethical responsibilities impinging on the application of knowledge and judgement.
- To be able to communicate clearly and without ambiguity to specialist and non-specialist audiences conclusions and the knowledge and ultimate grounds on which they are founded.
- To possess the learning skills enabling further study which, of necessity, will largely be self-directed or autonomous.
- To acquire skills for analysing complex legal situations which often encompass international situations or issues related to foreign subjects.
- To acquire basic knowledge of the current state of international and European human rights law
- To acquire the ability to formulate legal arguments.
- To acquire the skills to apply the knowledge acquired to legal argument in forensic practice.
- To be able to judge international human rights protection critically.

Specific:

- To understand the role of human rights in today's principal international organizations.
- To master the tools needed to produce legal arguments in cases related to human rights protection.
- To master international control mechanisms in the field of human rights protection.
- To acquire specialist knowledge of forensic practice before international human rights courts and political control bodies
- To acquire deep knowledge of the application of international human rights law by national institutions, particularly the ombudsman
